For the second year in a row, the AKC has sponsored a Foundation Stock Service (FSS) Meet the Breed booth at the 4day, Rose City Classic in Portland, Oregon. But I wanted to go, check out some truffles in person, and see what the local truffle scene was like.

We met a woman (whose name I can't recall) with Zara - a white Lagotto she is 3 years old, recently had her first puppy, and lives in Canada (although Zara initially came from Australia). A beautiful dog with great proportions. It was really fun to meet them, and Zara's tight curls put Luca's recently clipped coat to shame. <u>Meet the Breed Events Abound</u> Lagotto at the Detroit Kennel Club Show!

What is FSS: FSS is the foundation Stock Service, a program offered by AKC to breeds new to the USA. AKC offers recording services to these breeds thus ensuring the establishment and maintenance of an accurate stud book. Eventually the breed becomes eligible to compete in AKC events; first, companion events such as obedience, agility, rally, etc; then, when well-enough established, in conformation.

The Detroit Kennel Club: The Detroit Kennel Club holds one of the few remaining benched shows in the US. The dogs have to be on the premises all day long which give the public the opportunity to see some of the finest examples of every breed currently recognized by the American Kennel Club. Each breed is benched together – the benches being raised platforms on which their crates sit. Typical of benched shows, the public turns out en masse to see the dogs – over 60,000 people come to see the dogs at the DKC shows.

The Detroit Kennel Club show FSS (Foundation Stock Service) exhibit was fabulous. Ken and Kathy Weiss came from Cleveland, Ohio with Waldo. Mariana and Sonny Cejic, from London, Ontario came with their 11 month old puppy, Teo, who is brown and white. I brought our 4 year old brown roan girl, Eppy.

The DKC was hoping to that perhaps a half a dozen or so breeds would participate, but there were actually 21 FSS breeds attending. The Club provided us with a lovely set-up in which to display our dogs. Kathy was brilliant with the decorations - Ken had the foresight to bring crepe paper and tissue in Italian colors and Kathy made gorgeous green rosettes with swathes of entwined red & white crepe paper between them quick as could be!

We had the Cesky Terriers on one side of us, Spanish Water Dogs on the other side and beyond them the Cirneco dell'Etna, another Italian breed that is an elegant little hound from Sicily.

The dogs were wonderful with everyone that stopped to visit. Kids on foot, toddlers in strollers, folks with canes, in wheelchairs, on foot - nothing fazed them at all. I was so proud of our guys! We talked with hundreds of people each day to the point where we were all a bit hoarse at the end of each day. The dogs were tired by the end of Saturday, but by Sunday morning were back in fine form.

Some people asked if our Lagotto were "Obama" dogs, others thought they were "Porties". Most said "A what?!!" when we told them that our guys were "Lagotto Romagnolo", so we soon began explaining that they were Italian water dogs, called Lagotto Romagnolo, and then went on to explain the how the name originated. You can actually do this in about 2 and half sentences. And most surprising of all, there were any number of folks who said "Oh yes, we saw those on Animal Planet."!

Each day we did two, 3-4 minute presentations for a seated audience of about 80 to 100 people. Ken did a super job of speaking, managing to cover the breed history, personality, energy level and health as well as the fact that the Lagotto is a working breed whose job is to find truffles. A lot of people expressed surprise that dogs would hunt for anything other than animals.

This show typically has a gate of 30,000 people each day so you can imagine how busy we were. There were quite a few people whose interest went beyond simple curiosity. All of us tried to give a balanced picture of the breed - as well as the intelligence and the sweetness we talked about the hole-digging and the activity level.

As for next year – this first undertaking was so successful that the DKC plans to establish the FSS exhibit as a regular educational event in conjunction with their March shows.

Finding the Right Puppy, Legally

This is one in a series of articles on finding the right puppy. In this article, we look at changes in the U.S. Farm Bill 2008-2012 and how these changes affect anyone considering purchasing a puppy from overseas.

The portion of the Farm Bill that is referred to as the Animal Welfare Act has changed. Actually, the change took place with the passage of the Farm Bill of 2008 – 2012, but rules have to be written to enforce the law. Thus, it is just now coming to the attention of most Americans.

Specifically, the Act now makes it illegal for any person to transport any puppies into the United States *for the purpose of resale* unless the puppy is in good health, has all required vaccinations and *is at least 6 months old*.

Q. What is the purpose of the law?

A. When a breed is popular in the United States, it often attracts the attention of those people that, frankly, are driven by the bottom line. As a puppy seeker, you might think of one as a breeder, or a broker. In fact, some will even boast of the fact that they will find you a puppy if they don't have one on hand. The result has been disastrous for some breeds. Testimony before Congress indicates that many times the puppies were unhealthy, and often the parentage was not as stated. There were enough people that suffered heartaches for the Congress to amend the law.

Q. Does this mean I can no longer buy a puppy from overseas?

A. You can still buy direct from breeders in a foreign country. However, a breeder/broker in the US cannot buy a puppy for you and resell it to you on their contract. Your purchase must be between you and the foreign breeder.

Q. Is it legal for the foreign breeder to ship the puppy to me and I can pay someone here in the US for the puppy?

A. No, that would be considered an indirect transfer of ownership, or resale.

Q. Will all puppies imported have to be over 6 months of age?

A. Only if they are imported for the purpose of resale.

Q. When does the law take effect?

A. The effective date of the law was May 22, 2008. The penalties have been established by Congress. The rules on enforcement are the responsibility of the Dept of Agriculture and Department of Homeland Security.

Q. Where could I find the names of breeders?

A. The breeder listing at www.lagottous.com
contains a number of US and foreign breeders.
While the listing in and of itself is not a guarantee, it does give you a starting place with breeders who have pledged to abide by and uphold the Bylaws and Code of Ethics of the Lagotto Club of America.

It is important to note that there have not been a huge number of problems associated with the importing of Lagotto puppies, yet. However, as the breed is rapidly becoming more popular, it is only a matter of time before we would be faced with some of the nightmare stories we have read of other breeds. This bill is timely in that sense, and we should all welcome it as a tool to help us find the perfect puppy.

Annual Reports

The following were reports given by the Board at the Annual Meeting, held on January 24, 2010.

President's Report for 2009 and Looking Forward for 2010

In January, 2009, the torch of the President was passed from Judith Martin to Bob Zemmel. Bob is a long-time Lagotto fancier and breeder and under his leadership, the Lagotto Club of America had its busiest year yet. With several radunos (gatherings), increased publicity through print ads and television, not to mention the Columbus Day Parade and Meet the Breed Event, both in New York City, our breed has gone from one of obscurity, to one that is becoming recognized, and certainly, desired. It has been with the hard work of our beloved members that these things can happen, and your work is truly appreciated. In December, Bob had to step down as President as his restaurant business and breeding became too demanding. Bob remain a member of the LCA and we thank him for the work he accomplished.

As Vice President, I was asked to fill Bob's shoes and will be the one who takes us into 2010. I find this an honor and I will work very hard for you and the breed. It serves no purpose for me to repeat things you will hear later, but there are a couple of things that may not be mentioned in the other reports.

First, the Board felt that we need to make sure the membership is aware of the many dog legislation issues that will very soon be discussed in the legislative bodies of our 50 states, as well as in the Congress. To that end, we asked Roberta York to take on the task of AKC Legislative Liaison. She agreed to do that and will, from time to time, send us emails about these proposed pet laws with information on how we can make a difference.

Second, in talking with many of you, the Board felt that it is time to begin planning for our first National Specialty. Martha Schneider is the Specialty Chair and will be naming a part of her committee in the next couple of months. This venture will require two things, money and dedicated workers. While the Board was originally in hopes that we could hold this Specialty in the Spring of 2011, Martha has advised that there is simply too much work to be done in preparation. We are now aiming for 2012. You'll hear more about this, and the events leading up to it, in the coming months.


Annual Lagotto Club of America Website Report

Membership Committee Report

Big thank you to Ed Mangan who helped organize the Excel database and has offered to make address labels for the club mailings.

At the start of the year we had 55 total members in our club; Individual and Family members, Associate Members and 8 non-US Members.

As of this past week we have 118 total US members in our club and 15 non-US members. We have doubled our membership this year. Interest in our breed and our club continues to increase and we have several member applications pending at this time. Our club membership has grown and continues to increase.

Some persons have said they were not certain what type of membership to sign up for and I will explain: Individual membership is a voting membership for one person. A family/dual membership gives the right to vote to two family members. We have established an Associate Membership option to persons who do not yet own a Lagotto and either hope to get a dog, or are just curious and want to learn more about the breed. Associate and non-US members do not have a vote for club business.

Last year we had regional Radunos or "gatherings" throughout the country. The SouthWest area had its third annual Raduno in AZ, with the North East in CT and South East in TN having their first events. These Radunos had large gatherings of people and dogs, and were a lot of fun for all who attended. These events are a good opportunity to get to know other club members and see all their dogs.

New for this year will be a CD mailed to all of you that will include an editable and printable membership list with other important club information as well. It is in the final planning stage and will hopefully be available in the first quarter.

2009 History Report

The following list highlights the historical events of the Lagotto Club of America, its members and dogs:

January:

- The first Annual Meeting was held via teleconference on Sunday, January 11, 2009. Over 30 members took part in that meeting around the US, as well as Canada, New Zealand and the UK.
- Jim Sanford and Lagotto "Tom" from Tennessee, attend the Oregon Truffle Festival, and impress everyone with the abilities of the Lagotto Romagnolo in truffle hunting.
- The LCA placed an educational ad in the annual issue of "Puppies USA"

February:

- Lagotto Primo was the first Lagotto to be successfully re-homed using the LCA Rescue & Re-homing process.
- LCA received approval from the AKC and the show chair to have a "Meet The Breed" booth at the Fiesta Cluster shows at West World in Scottsdale, AZ.

March:

• A team of Lagottos in the UK competed in Agility at the prestigious Crufts Show. This was a first for this breed.

May:

• Southeast Raduno, held on May 16, 2009 in Chattanooga, Tennessee. There were 37 in attendance and 35 dogs.

September:

• Southwest Raduno held, September 26, 2009, in Prescott, Arizona. Approximately 40 people were in attendance.

October:

- Northeast Raduno October 3rd and 4th 2009 Held in Old Saybrook, Connecticut. This was a two-day event and members from 9 states and Canada joined the event.
- October 12, 2009 Columbus Day Parade AKC sponsors the Italian Breeds. Paul and Ellen Lemberg, and their Lagotto Mocca, represented the Lagotto Club of America.
- October 17th and 18th, 2009 Meet the Breed Event at Javits Center in New York City. With over 36,000 people in attendance to this event, the Lagotto received lots of interest.
- October, 2009 Annual Italian Raduno in Bagnara, Italy this event was attended by members of the LCA, to include Bob Zemmel, Ken Weiss, Hilarie Gibbs-Sykes.

December:

• December 5th, 2009, Animal Planet highlighted various rare breeds on their show, Dogs 101. The Lagotto was one of the highlighted dogs, and interest continues to grow.

AKC Liaison Report

We continue to enjoy a good working relationship with the AKC and AKC FSS. They are happy to have a club that is willing to work with them in so many areas.

As is noted elsewhere, the Lagotto Club of America joined the AKC in the Columbus Day Parade in NYC, was a participating Parent Club at the Meet the Breeds event at Javits Ctr, NYC. We also were active participants at 3 other AKC Meet the Breeds events, including the Rose City Classic in Oregon yesterday. We are scheduled to have dogs in attendance for the Detroit Kennel Club benched shows in March.

There is good news for those that have an interest in AKC Conformation shows. At the AKC January Board meeting, there was discussion about lowering the required numbers for FSS breeds to between 150 and 200 dogs with 3 generation pedigrees in order to enter Miscellaneous class. This would fast track the Lagotto to possibly be moved to

Miscellaneous Class much faster than originally anticipated. The AKC Board will discuss this more at their February meeting. I will keep you all informed.
