What a wonderful National Specialty we had in York, Pennsylvania, last spring. Jeff Fisher, our Show Chairman, organized an event that was the envy of many. So what is a National Specialty Show? From Wikipedia:

*A **specialty show** is a dog show which reviews a single breed...A specialty show may be regional or national. A "Best in Show" win at a national specialty show is tremendously prestigious, indicating that the winning dog or bitch triumphed at a contest which attracted entries from the most serious fanciers of that breed in the country or continent. Some specialty shows attract international entries.*



"The LRCA is the AKC parent club for the Lagotto Romagnolo. We work to preserve and protect the Lagotto Romagnolo and provide education, guidance and mentorship to all who are interested in the welfare and advancement of the breed." One of our goals is to advance the breed. That is why we have conformation (dog show) events. We are attempting to select the best characteristics within the breed to advance those qualities. A good breeder looks for temperament, physical structure, genetics, performance abilities, paternal histories, and other factors to advance and protect the Lagotto Romagnolo. Dog shows are one component in that selection process.

At our National Specialty, we engaged in social events that provided opportunities for everyone to salute old friends and make new ones. We laughed, ate, and exchanged ideas and photos of our furry children. We were honored to have distinguished judging from Italy with Sr. Gilberto Grandi, who selected the following dogs from an outstanding field of entries. These dogs received an invitation to attend the internationally acclaimed Crufts Dog Show: www.crufts.org.uk in Birmingham, England, to represent the LRCA. As the world's largest dog show, Crufts had over 22,000 dogs entered, including 88 Lagotti.

In my report and the committee reports: <https://lagottous.com/Annual-Meeting-Documents>, you will find that we had 782 new Lagotti registrations last year for a total of 2,742. You can review the documents and find out where all the Lagotti live. Also, check out the President's Awards given to Sandy Mignogna, Mike Madrid, Dawn Meiklejohn, and Allison Baker.

We have also increased our performance participation with 204 unique performance titles outside of conformation.

Now, I'm no longer a country boy with a dog. I have three Lagotti: Gelato, Cannoli, and Macaroon. They are all family. None of them have "work" to do on the farm. They can just lie around all day as couch potatoes and enjoy the good life. My wife occasionally cooks for them and we keep them in the house, rather than a barn. 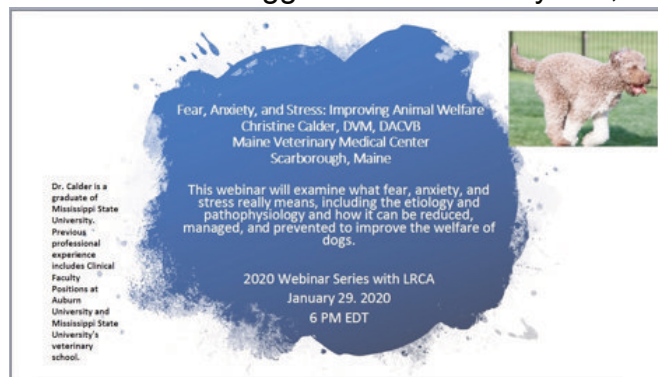
Club News

Election of Officers and Directors: There being no opposition to the slate of the nominating committee submitted to the membership on October 5th, there was no need to ballot the membership. Therefore, the slate of the nominating committee was declared elected.

Mail Ballot: In late October, voting members received mail ballots for the proposed revisions to the Breed Standard and the Code of Ethics.

- **Breed Standard:** The Breed Standard has been accepted. The Standard now goes to the AKC Board for approval and, if approved, will go into effect on March 1, 2020. As AKC staff reviewed the Standard before it was put to a vote, it is anticipated that the AKC Board will respond favorably. The revised Breed Standard can be viewed under the breed information tab at: www.lagottous.com
- **Code of Ethics:** A revised Code of Ethics (CoE) was also accepted. A major change is that breeders must now send health test results of their breeding stock to the OFA (Orthopedic Foundation for Animals) to be entered into the OFA public database. When results of all required testing have been submitted, the Canine Health Information Center (CHIC), which works in conjunction with OFA, will issue a "CHIC" number for the dog.
- The following tests are now required: PennHIP and/or OFA hip x-rays, patella luxation, CAER eye exam (annually or no more than 12 months prior to breeding), and DNA testing for BFJE and LSD.
- The CoE can be viewed on the home page at: www.lagottous.com under Club Documents, on the About LRCA tab.

Mind Your Manners

Training with Toni Kay-Wolff

Oww! That hurts!!

We love our puppies, but we don't love those baby shark teeth! Puppies mouth one another; this is normal. The mouthing can get harder and turn to a bite. That's when you'll hear a puppy yelp or snark at the offender.

Lagotti are not generally mouthy or bite-y as puppies, but every puppy is different. High activity levels in the house can add to a puppy's "sins of enthusiasm," leading to mouthiness. If you have kids, you'll want to watch for this.

It's crucial that puppies learn bite inhibition from one another. What happens when they start mouthing/biting us? Since we never want teeth on human flesh, here are some tips to help.

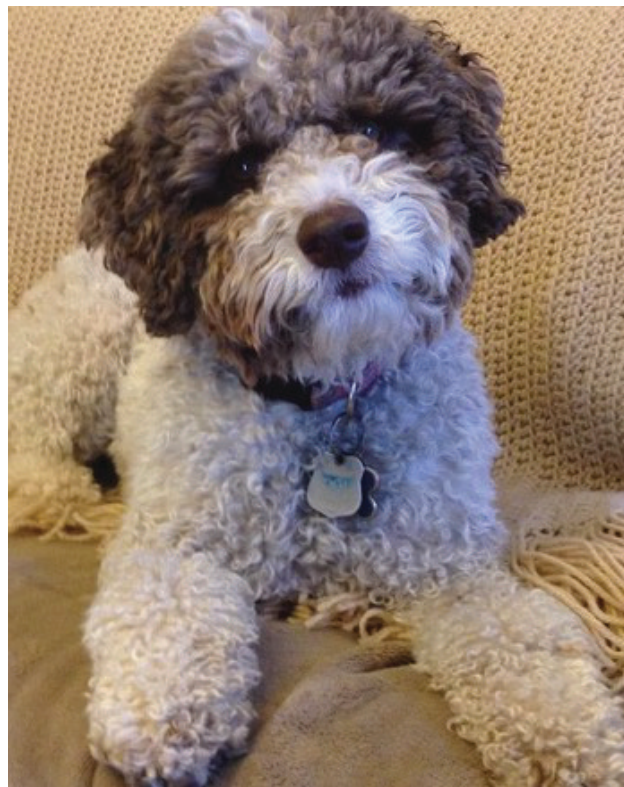
Do's:

- Do have plenty of appropriate toys for your puppy to work on. They need to get something in the back of their mouth for the molars as they are breaking through.
- Do be sure your puppy is exercised (as appropriate for their age.)
- Do be sure your puppy is getting enough sleep. Tired puppies aren't always good puppies; sometimes they are cranky and ramp up easily.
- Do be sure to keep your hands moving slowly around their heads and mouth. Moving too fast (kids and men are prone to this) will cause many puppies to ramp up and use their mouths.

If your puppy doesn't give up after trying some of these solutions, try a time out. Simply put your puppy in its crate. No emotion. No "bad dog." You are transportation only. A good ten minutes should be enough. This is not punitive; it's simply cause and effect. You use your mouth on me, I stop playing and you are in time out.

Don'ts

- Don't pull away if you feel teeth. The movement will cause your puppy to chase and try to grab it. Hold your hand still and give a very loud "OWW!" Say it loud enough that it



startles the puppy and they stop, sit back, and look at you. When they do, stay calm, tell them to do something they know how to do (sit is great) and then you can reward the sit.

- Don't substitute something else to chew on. This is important, as it can create a sequence of mouth/bite, get fun toy to play with or chew. That's when the command to sit works well. You are rewarding the sit, not teaching the puppy that mouthing gets a toy or bone.
- Don't use your hand to correct, hit (even lightly) or hold their muzzle closed. While this might work for experienced trainers or breeders, most puppy owners will have terrible timing and not remove their hand at the right time. Lagotti can be especially sensitive to this kind of negative reinforcement, and you could be teaching your puppy to be wary of your hands near its mouth/face. We definitely don't want that.
- Don't make the mistake of letting a puppy mouth you even though it may not hurt at first. Puppies don't "grow out" of behaviors; they "grow into" them. Anything they practice they get better at!

What do I give my puppy to chew on?

Here's what I've found works well for puppies. As always, **supervise very closely** with anything you give your puppy that it can swallow:

- Frozen carrots (the big ones, not baby carrots). I like to have a few frozen at once. As it defrosts, I switch them out.
- Frozen wash cloth (soak, twist, freeze)
- 12" Made in America bully sticks (they can get them in the back of their mouths.) Tip: Always get much bigger than you think your pup needs. Take away when it is soft and cut off the ends. Remove when it's 5" long.
- Himalayan Yak Bones (as puppies they can't chip off pieces, but watch anyway.)
- Kong Puppy toy
- Multipet Nuts for Knots Ball Dog toy

- Nylabone Just For Puppies: Key Ring, Bone, and Puppy Dog Teething Chew Toy
- Nylabone Puppy Starter Packs: Puppy Chew Toys

The Truffle Report

December, 2019

As the weather cools and the last leaves fall in the Pacific Northwest, our thoughts turn to truffles. Even the dogs have an extra spring in their step in anticipation of the coming season and the promise of new adventures. In the Willamette Valley, between the Coast and Cascade ranges of Oregon, truffle season usually begins close to Christmastime.

We're early this year. Very early. Because the rains came in August, September, and October, explorative early forays in November have resulted in impressive hauls of both white and black truffles. As of early December, however, they are not fully ripe and will need a few more weeks underground to mature.

Truffle dogs all over the Willamette Valley are brushing up on their scenting skills after a long summer. Hunters are scouting new locations. And truffles are developing their delicious aromas under the forest floor.

My class of prospective hunters is learning to work with their dogs as a team to find the buried treasures. We start in a classroom to learn about the varieties of truffles and their habitat and to introduce the dogs to the scent. Then we move to a local park to learn how to give an alert, discriminate from other scents, ignore distraction and to avoid tracking, as well as other ways our very smart dogs try to cheat. In January, this group of dogs will hunt in a real forest with the assistance of my mentor dog, Gnocchi. Five of my ten students are Lagotti, one as young as four months, and they are all overachievers.

Although any breed of dog can learn to hunt truffles, the Lagotto Romagnolo is particularly well suited to the job. Their medium size and nearly square shape makes for an agile brush jumper. Their curly coat gives protection from the elements. And their willingness to please and propensity to form strong bonds with their people make for an ideal hunting companion.

Orchard owners are beginning their harvest with dogs trained to sniff for the European

black Perigord truffle. These orchards have been planted with truffle infused hazelnut and oak trees in hopes that after five to ten years, they will produce a crop worth far more than grapes, produce, or just about anything else. We are blessed in the Willamette Valley in that almost anything will grow here.

In addition to preparations for forest hunting, we are working with truffle teams gearing up for the Joriad, a truffle hunting competition that takes place every January in Eugene as part of the Oregon Truffle Festival. All truffle hunters who are not professionals are welcome to compete. The event is judged in a dirt-floored horse arena, with the finalists moving on to compete in a truffle producing forest. In this sort of competitive event, the ability to communicate with your dog, to provide clear direction and to read her signals is crucial. It will be fun to see who wins.

Our friends in Washington State are already finding impressive quantities of nice truffles. They have a slightly different climate, and are always a few weeks ahead of us here in Oregon.

It's an exciting time in the Willamette Valley with a full season ahead. The dogs are ready and willing, and we have a lot to look forward to.
